- Laboratory






### Food Program Statutory/Regulatory Authority

- North Carolina Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act
- Implementing regulations adopted by reference in the North Carolina Administrative Code (21CFR)

### **Resources/Program Scope** 100 Counties>4 Regions>4 Field Supervisors 30 inspectors, ~1700 manufacturing firms



### **MFRPS Participation:**

2007: Pilot State:

>> Self Assessment>>No funding

## **2008:** Rapid Response Team CAP >>Emphasis on Response Activities >>DFSR focuses resources on MFRPS – 2010

### **2013:** MFRPS CAP

>>Ongoing implementation, moving to conformance



### **Current Status MFRPS Implementation**

• **2013:** 60 month Audit

### • **December 2015:** 60+2 Audit

- ✓ 7 years of implementation
- ✓ Moving from implementation to demonstrating conformance



### **Major Impacts**

- Developing Policies and Procedures
  - Review process
  - Document control
  - Training
- Dedicated Staff Resources
- Implementation Support from OP
